



## **Report: Denver Dynamite 11- Detroit Waza Flo Pro 6**

Waza's Nikki Djokic scored a hat trick in his debut and Richard Godfrey scored two goals, but it was not enough to defeat a talented Denver squad as the Waza Flo Pro boys fell 11-6.

Waza played its best soccer of the season and went into halftime tied at 3. Early in the third quarter, the Motor City boys took a 5-4 lead, but penalties and defensive mistakes killed them as the Dynamite went on a 7-1 run to close out the game.

The turning point came with six minutes left when Detroit midfielder Blake Ordell was shown a straight red card for a retaliation foul. The red card meant Waza had to play the rest of the game a man down and Denver took full advantage to secure the victory.

## **Report: Colorado Lightning 10- Detroit Waza Flo Pro 2**
